

Introduction

ASK Students

Do you remember who Abraham Lincoln is? (allow students to share what they know about him) You may have seen President Lincoln's picture on the penny or on the five-dollar bill, but do you know why he's still one of the most important leaders in America? President Lincoln led America during one of the most devastating periods in our nation's history — the Civil War. A civil war is a conflict between people who live in the same country.

First Shot of the Civil War

TELL Students

The Civil War was fought from 1861-1865 between 20 northern states (known as the Union) and 11 southern states (the Confederacy). The remaining 5 states were known as the Border States. In April 1861, the first shots in the Civil War were fired by Confederates against Americans at Fort Sumter in South Carolina. The Confederate forces captured the fort, leading four more states — Virginia, Arkansas, North Carolina, and Tennessee — to join the Confederacy. Although Abraham Lincoln didn't want a war, he wanted the Union more. In response, Lincoln decided to fight to save the union. For the next several years, a devastating war would rage on between the Union of the north and the Confederacy of the south. More than one million Americans from both the northern and southern states would die.

Emancipation Proclamation

KEY Point

<u>President</u> Lincoln and the Union were strongly against <u>slavery</u>, and the opportunity arose to end slavery in the United States once and for all. The first step came with Lincoln's <u>Emancipation</u> Proclamation, issued on January 1, 1863, which freed all slaves in the southern states. However the news took until June 19, 1865 to reach states like Texas, making "Juneteenth" the day that is celebrated as the end of slavery.

For the Union soldiers, including thousands of Black Americans now able to fight in the Union's Army and Navy, the war was no longer just about keeping America together as one <u>nation</u>, but also for ending slavery. Every victory for the Union became a victory for freedom allowing the liberated to become liberators.




