Dream Builder Pledge

Objective: To understand the importance of education in achieving goals. To encourage students to set educational goals for themselves. To promote a sense of responsibility for their own education.

Materials:

- 1 Whiteboard or blackboard
- 2. Markers or chalk
- 3. Small blank cards or sticky notes
- 4. Colorful markers, crayons, or colored pencils
- 5. Poster boards (optional)
- 6. Educational books or resources (related to different careers, colleges, or universities)

Introduction:

Begin by discussing the concept of goals with the students. Ask questions like:

- What are some dreams or goals you have for your future?
- How can education help you achieve them?

Brainstorming:

- Write the word "Education" on the board and create a mind map with the students.
- Discuss how education is the foundation for achieving various careers and goals.
