

Faith Supplement Instructional Goals

The Sacred Bond of Marriage

A Mini-Lesson

Objective

Students will understand the importance of marriage as reflected in the Bible and exemplified through the correspondence of John and Abigail Adams.

Introduction


- 1. Review background information on John and Abigail Adams and their relationship.
