Learning Objectives

Students will be able to

- Explain what a farewell is and identify ways people say goodbye, relating it to how presidents, like George Washington, say goodbye when leaving office.
- Identify and discuss key values from Washington's Farewell Address, such as unity, kindness, and caring for their country, and how these values can be practiced in their everyday lives.
- Demonstrate making thoughtful decisions that promote friendship and cooperation, illustrating the importance of careful choices in maintaining a positive environment.
- Create a "Wisdom Wheel" or engage in drawing activities to express the lessons they learned from Washington's Farewell Address, reinforcing their understanding of unity and leadership in a fun, hands-on way.

TELL Students

Let's start by pretending we are leaving a fun place, like a playground or a birthday party! What are some things we might do when we say goodbye? [Encourage students to demonstrate waving, saying goodbye, giving hugs, or high-fives.] Great job, everyone! Just like how we say goodbye, presidents have their own special way of leaving office.

ASK Students

What are some ways you think presidents might say goodbye when they finish their time in office?

TELL Students

Presidents often say goodbye by giving speeches or writing letters to share their thoughts and hopes for the future. They want to leave their country in a good place, just like when we say goodbye to our friends by wishing them well. This is exactly what George Washington did in his Farewell Address. A **Farewell Address** is a

special speech or letter given by a leader, like a president, when they are leaving their job. In this address, they share important thoughts, advice, and hopes for the future. It is a way for them to say goodbye and encourage the people to work together and continue to care for their country. George Washington's Farewell Address is one of the most famous examples, where he shared his wisdom about unity and staying strong as a nation.

TELL Students (continued)

Unity means coming together as one and working together. It is like a team where everyone helps each other and shares the same goals. When people are united, they support each other and make things better as a group. Just like how friends stick together to have fun and solve problems! George Washington used this special moment to share important advice with everyone about how to keep our country strong and united.

ASK Students

What do you think George Washington wanted to tell the people in his Farewell Address, and why do you think it was important for him to share that advice as he was leaving office?

TELL Students

George Washington wanted to encourage the people to work together and remain united, reminding them of the importance of caring for their country. He understood that his experiences as president could help guide future leaders and citizens. This advice was important because he wanted to set a strong foundation for America, so it could thrive long after his presidency ended.

ASK Students

Why do you think it was important for George Washington to remind the people about working together and caring for their country? How do you think that can help us today?

TELL Students

It was important for George Washington to remind the people about working together because a strong nation depends on unity and cooperation. When everyone cares for their country and supports each other, it builds a better future. Washington understood that his experiences as president could provide valuable lessons for

everyone, helping them to work together even after he stepped down.

ASK Students

How do you think George Washington announced that he would not be returning to office?

TELL Students

George Washington announced he would not be returning to office by writing a letter to the people. He wanted to make sure they understood his decision clearly and share his feelings about his time as president. Washington was known for being respectful and sincere, so he would have wanted to express his gratitude and offer advice

for the future in a way that would inspire and guide the country. In this public letter, published on September 19, 1796, in Philadelphia's *American Daily Advertiser*, Washington announced his retirement and shared advice to help Americans build a strong, free, and secure nation for future generations. **Retirement** is when someone stops working, usually after many years in their job.

TELL Students (continued)

It often happens when people reach a certain age or feel they have done enough in their careers. When someone retires, they can enjoy more free time to do things they love, like spending time with family, traveling, or picking up new hobbies. In the case of George Washington, he retired from being president to spend more time at home and share his wisdom with others. He wanted to ensure that the values and lessons he learned during his time as president would guide the country even after he was gone.

ASK Students

What did George Washington want people to remember and follow after he retired from being president? Why do you think it is important for leaders to share their advice with others?

TELL Students

Washington wanted people to remember the importance of unity and working together for the good of the country. It is important for leaders to share their advice because it helps others learn from their experiences and make better decisions in the future. Just like your mom, teacher, or coach gives you advice based on their experiences,

ASK Students

Can anyone tell me one thing you think is important from his farewell?

TELL Students

One important thing from George Washington's Farewell Address is his message about unity. He encouraged Americans to work together and support each other, reminding everyone that a strong, united country is essential for success and happiness. This idea helps guide leaders and citizens even today.

TELL Students

In 1796, George Washington had been the president for more than seven years, and his second term was almost over. Today, presidents can only serve two terms, which is a total of eight years, but back then, there were no rules about how long someone could be president.

ASK Students

What do you think is important about George Washington deciding to stop being president after two terms, especially since there weren't any rules about it back then?

TELL Students

It is important that George Washington chose to stop being president after two terms because it showed that he valued the idea of sharing power and letting others take on leadership roles. He believed that a good leader should put the needs of the country first, even if it meant stepping aside. George Washington could have decided to run for a third term and keep being president, but

he didn't want to. He was ready to retire and spend time at home. In his Farewell Address, he talked to the American people about why he didn't want to be president anymore. Many of these people had fought with him in the Revolutionary War and had supported him as their first president. Washington wanted to make sure they understood his reasons for stepping down and the importance of unity and good leadership.

ASK Students

Why do you think it was a brave decision for George Washington to choose not to run for a third term as president, and how do you think this decision helped shape the future of our country?

TELL Students

It was a brave decision for George Washington to choose not to run for a third term because it showed he was more focused on what was best for the country rather than his own power. By stepping aside, he set an example for future leaders about the importance of sharing power and ensuring that no one person has too much control. However, at first, Washington wanted to stop being president after his first term. But there was a problem brewing between Britain and France, and the United States was in danger of getting involved. His friends urged him to stay and help the country during this tough time. They believed he could lead the nation wisely and help keep it safe. This shows that even great leaders sometimes face tough choices, and Washington felt a sense of duty to protect his country.

ASK Students

Why do you think George Washington's decision to step aside after two terms was so important, and how do you think his choice to stay during a difficult time helped the country?

TELL Students

George Washington's decision to step aside after two terms was important because it helped establish a tradition of limited presidential power, which shows that leadership is about serving the people rather than seeking personal gain. By choosing to stay during a challenging time, he provided stability and guidance to our country. When he finally decided to retire, Washington wrote his Farewell Address. In it, he shared important advice with the country. He told everyone to stick together and be united, to be careful about political groups that might cause disagreements, and to avoid getting too involved in other countries' problems. His words were meant to

encourage cooperation and caution, reminding Americans to pick unity for the good of the nation. **Caution** means being careful and thinking before you act. It is about paying attention to what might happen and making smart choices to stay safe. For example, if you see a wet floor, you might walk slowly so you don't slip. Being cautious helps keep us safe and avoids problems!

ASK Students

Why do you think it was important for George Washington to encourage unity and caution in his Farewell Address, and how can we practice being cautious and working together in our own lives?

TELL Students

It was important for George Washington to encourage unity and caution because he wanted to remind everyone that working together makes the country stronger. When we cooperate and think carefully about our choices, we help keep ourselves and others safe. By doing this in our own lives, like helping a friend or being careful when playing, we contribute to a positive environment. By choosing to step down after two terms, George Washington

set a great example for future presidents. He showed that it was important to put the country first and that sometimes, it's good to let someone else take the lead. Washington also knew that as the first president, he would set an example for future presidents. If he were to die while in office, people might think that presidents were elected for life, just like kings.

ASK Students

Why do you think setting an example of unity and caution was so important for George Washington as the first president, and how can we apply those lessons in our own lives today?

TELL Students

Setting an example of unity and caution was important for George Washington as the first president because he wanted to show that strong leadership involves working together and making wise choices for the good of the country. By encouraging these values, he helped create a foundation for future leaders to follow. In our own lives, we can apply these lessons by collaborating with others, being considerate of our decisions, and understanding that sometimes, it is best to let others take charge for the benefit of everyone. By 1796, America was safe from getting involved in the war between Britain and France, and it was clear that it was time for Washington to step down. This would show that the president's job was to serve the people, not just to hold onto power.

ASK Students

Why do you think George Washington's example of unity and caution is still important for leaders today, and how can we practice these values in our daily lives?

TELL Students

George Washington's example of unity and caution is still important for leaders today because it reminds us that effective leadership is about serving others and making choices that benefit everyone. By practicing these values in our daily lives—like working together with friends, being thoughtful about

our actions, and knowing when to let others lead—we can create a positive environment and strengthen our communities. In his Farewell Address, Washington explained why he was retiring and thanked the American people for their support and for the honors they had given him. He also shared some important advice and warned about dangers that could harm America.

ASK Students

What do you think are some of the important pieces of advice that George Washington shared in his Farewell Address, and why do you think they are still relevant for us today?

TELL Students

Some important pieces of advice that George Washington shared in his Farewell Address included the need for unity among the states, caution about disagreements, and the importance of staying out of foreign conflicts. These messages are still relevant today because they remind us that working together and being careful about our decisions can help keep our country strong and safe. At that time, America was a young country trying to establish

itself. The Constitution was less than 10 years old, and the Bill of Rights (the first ten amendments to the Constitution) was less than 5 years old. The **Constitution** is a special document that tells how our government works. It explains the rules and rights that help keep our country fair and safe. The Constitution was written a long time ago, and it helps make sure everyone is treated equally and has a say in how things are done. It is like a big

guide for our country! The capital, Washington D.C., was still being built, and the federal government was in Philadelphia. America had just faced a big crisis with France and Britain, Spain still controlled the land west of the Mississippi River, and the British still had a presence in Canada. A **crisis** is a time when something very serious or dangerous happens, and it needs to be fixed quickly. It can be a problem that makes people worried or scared, like a big storm, a health emergency, or a conflict. During a crisis, people work together to solve the problem and help each other stay safe.

ASK Students

Why did George Washington emphasize unity and caution in his Farewell Address, especially considering that America was still a young country facing many challenges?

TELL Students

George Washington talked about unity and being careful in his Farewell Address because he knew that America was a young country that needed to work together to be strong. There were many challenges ahead, like the possibility of conflicts with stronger countries. He wanted everyone to support each other to keep the new government safe and fair. This meant that working together and making smart choices were very important. The

idea of a government for the people was new, and there was no promise it would work. America had beautiful land with a lot of resources, which might attract other powerful countries that wanted it for themselves. **Resources** are things that people use to help them live, work, and grow. This can include natural things like water, trees, and minerals, as well as things like food, money, and

tools. Resources are important because they help us meet our needs and make life better!

ASK Students

Why do you think it was so important for George Washington to stress the need for unity and careful decision-making in his Farewell Address, especially given the challenges facing the young nation?

TELL Students

Shortly after Washington's Farewell Address was published, John Adams was elected as the second president of the United States. Washington went back

to his home at Mount Vernon, where he lived for less than three years before he sadly passed away from a throat infection on December 14, 1799. Washington's wisdom in his Farewell Address is still important today. Every year, the United States Senate reads this address to remind everyone about the importance of unity in our country's history and future. The **Senate** is a part of the United States government that helps make

laws. It is made up of people called senators, who represent each state. Each state has two senators, no matter how big or small it is. Senators talk about ideas for new laws, decide if they should be passed, and work together to help keep the country running smoothly. Washington's advice is a special gift for all Americans who want to learn from his example and help keep America free, strong, and safe. Washington's Farewell Address - Kindergarten Washington's Wisdom Wheel

Objective

Introduce kindergarten students to the key themes of George Washington's Farewell Address in a fun and engaging way, focusing on unity, friendship, and making good choices.

Materials Needed

- Paper plates (one for each student)
- Markers or crayons
- Scissors
- Brass fasteners (brads)
- Construction paper (for making "wisdom" cards)
- A spinner (can be made from cardboard or a pre-made spinner)
- Stickers or stamps for rewards

Introduction

Briefly review who George Washington was and the significance of his Farewell Address. Use simple language, emphasizing themes like friendship and working together.

Create the Wisdom Wheel

- Give each student a paper plate. Instruct them to decorate their plates with colors and drawings that represent unity, friendship, and good choices.
- Cut a smaller circle out of construction paper and write simple phrases related to the themes, such as "We work together," "Be a good friend," and "Stay safe." These will be the "wisdom" cards.
- Attach the wisdom cards to the center of the paper plate using a brass fastener, creating a wheel that can spin.

- After everyone has had a turn, gather the students in a circle. Discuss how they can show unity and friendship in their classroom and with others.
- Reinforce the ideas from Washington's message in simple terms.

Wrap-Up and Reward

- Conclude by highlighting how Washington wanted everyone to be good friends and work together.
- Give students stickers or stamps as a reward for their participation and effort.

Washington's Farewell Address - Kindergarten Washington's Role Play Rally

Objective

Help students understand the main themes of George Washington's Farewell Address through role-playing scenarios that emphasize unity, avoiding political parties, and maintaining peace.

Materials Needed

- Scenario cards with simple situations related to Washington's themes (e.g., making friends, resolving conflicts, sharing)
- Costumes or props for role play (hats, scarves, etc.)
- A large poster or chart paper with the key themes written on it
- Markers or crayons for drawing
- A song about George Washington and his Farewell Address (to the tune of "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star")

Introduction

Review George Washington and summarize the main themes of his Farewell Address using simple language.

Sing Along

Washington's Farewell Address - Kindergarten Washington's Role Play Rally

Distribute Scenario Cards

Hand out scenario cards to each group. Read the card with each group to ensure students understand their scenario. Examples might include:

- Scenario 1: Two friends disagree over which game to play. How can they resolve their conflict?
- Scenario 2: A new student joins the class. How can everyone make them feel welcome?
- Scenario 3: Friends are talking about their different favorite activities. How can they appreciate each other's choices without arguing?
- Give each group a few minutes to discuss their scenario and decide how they will act it out.

Role Play

- Have each group perform their skit for the class. Encourage creativity and expression!

- Review the key themes from Washington's Farewell Address and how the students can apply these lessons in their daily lives.
- Display the drawings in the classroom to reinforce the concepts learned.
