Memory Verse

 This verse emphasizes the importance of humility and placing others' needs above one's own. It reflects a commitment to serving and valuing others, which is essential for living out a faith-based life of service.

Endurance and Focus in Faith (Hebrews 12:1-2)

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith...



Endurance and Focus in Faith (Hebrews 12:1-2) continued ...For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God."

 This passage encourages believers to persevere in their faith journey, drawing strength from the examples of those who have gone before and keeping their focus on Jesus as the ultimate example of perseverance.

Stepping Up in Critical Moments (Esther 4:14)

"For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place, but you and your father's family will perish. And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?"

 This passage encourages taking bold action when faced with crucial moments. Esther's bravery in risking her life to save her people exemplifies standing up for what is right, even in the face of great personal risk.

Instructional Goals

- Students will gain a foundational understanding of the historical significance of the Alamo and the key figures involved in its defense.
- Students will connect the themes of courage, sacrifice, and perseverance from the Alamo to similar biblical principles and stories.
