THE FIRST GREAT AWAKENING - SCOPE & SEQUENCE

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Objectives	<p>Identify the First Great Awakening as a time when people became excited about their faith.</p> <p>Describe how the First Great Awakening helped people focus on their beliefs.</p> <p>Explain that John Winthrop wanted the Massachusetts Bay Colony to be a good example for others by working together and showing kindness.</p> <p>Define self-reliance as taking care of themselves and self-government as making decisions as a group.</p> <p>Analyze how leaders can use words to help make the world a better place.</p> <p>Understand that the First Great Awakening laid the foundation for the United States, influencing how our government operates today.</p>	<p>Identify the First Great Awakening as a time when people became excited about their faith and came together as a community.</p> <p>Compare how a colony, which is ruled by another country, differs from a community where people choose to work together for a common goal.</p> <p>Describe George Whitefield and Jonathan Edwards and their roles as preachers who inspired people to reconnect with God.</p> <p>Explain that the First Great Awakening taught that everyone is equal before God, which later became an important idea in the Declaration of Independence.</p> <p>Analyze how leaders can use words to help make the world a better place.</p> <p>Understand that faith means trusting in God, and it played a central role in uniting people during the First Great Awakening.</p>	<p>Explain why the First Great Awakening was important as a revival of faith and community values in the colonies.</p> <p>Interpret John Winthrop’s idea of being a “city upon a hill” and how it inspired the colonists to work together and set a good example.</p> <p>Explain how the First Great Awakening encouraged unity among colonists.</p> <p>Analyze the role of George Whitefield as a preacher during the First Great Awakening and how his sermons brought people together.</p> <p>Summarize Jonathan Edwards’ message about God’s love and forgiveness and how it inspired individuals and communities to grow closer to God.</p> <p>Connect the First Great Awakening’s emphasis on equality and self-government to the principles found in the Declaration of Independence.</p>	<p>Understand the concept of the First Great Awakening as a time of religious revival and unity.</p> <p>Recognize the importance of religious beliefs in shaping the lives and communities of early settlers.</p> <p>Explain the significance of John Winthrop’s speech and the idea of being “a city upon a hill.”</p> <p>Define the term “denomination” and explain how different Christian groups in the colonies practiced their faith.</p> <p>Explore how the concept of unity in the First Great Awakening influenced the development of community values.</p> <p>Identify the role of faith, liberty, life, and community as cornerstones that guide society.</p> <p>Understand the connection between self-reliance, self-government, and the foundational values of American democracy.</p>	<p>Recognize the historical context of the First Great Awakening.</p> <p>Describe the role of religious beliefs in helping settlers face challenges.</p> <p>Identify the meaning of “a city upon a hill” in John Winthrop’s speech.</p> <p>Understand how the Bible influenced early settlers.</p> <p>Discuss how the First Great Awakening brought communities together through shared faith.</p> <p>Identify how the beliefs of preachers like George Whitefield and Jonathan Edwards impacted unity in the colonies.</p> <p>Explain the relationship between unity, faith, and community during the First Great Awakening.</p> <p>Understand the role of self-reliance and self-government in shaping American identity.</p> <p>Discuss the connection between the First Great Awakening and the founding principles of America.</p>	<p>Identify key figures of the First Great Awakening, such as George Whitefield and Jonathan Edwards, and describe their contributions to the movement.</p> <p>Explain how the First Great Awakening encouraged personal reflection, repentance, and spiritual renewal.</p> <p>Define and identify the core values promoted during the First Great Awakening, including faith, unity, and community.</p> <p>Identify and explain how the First Great Awakening helped contribute to values in American society today.</p> <p>Compare the messages of George Whitefield and Jonathan Edwards, using similes, metaphors, and oxymorons to highlight their differences and similarities.</p> <p>Analyze the lasting impact of the First Great Awakening on American religious and political thought.</p>
